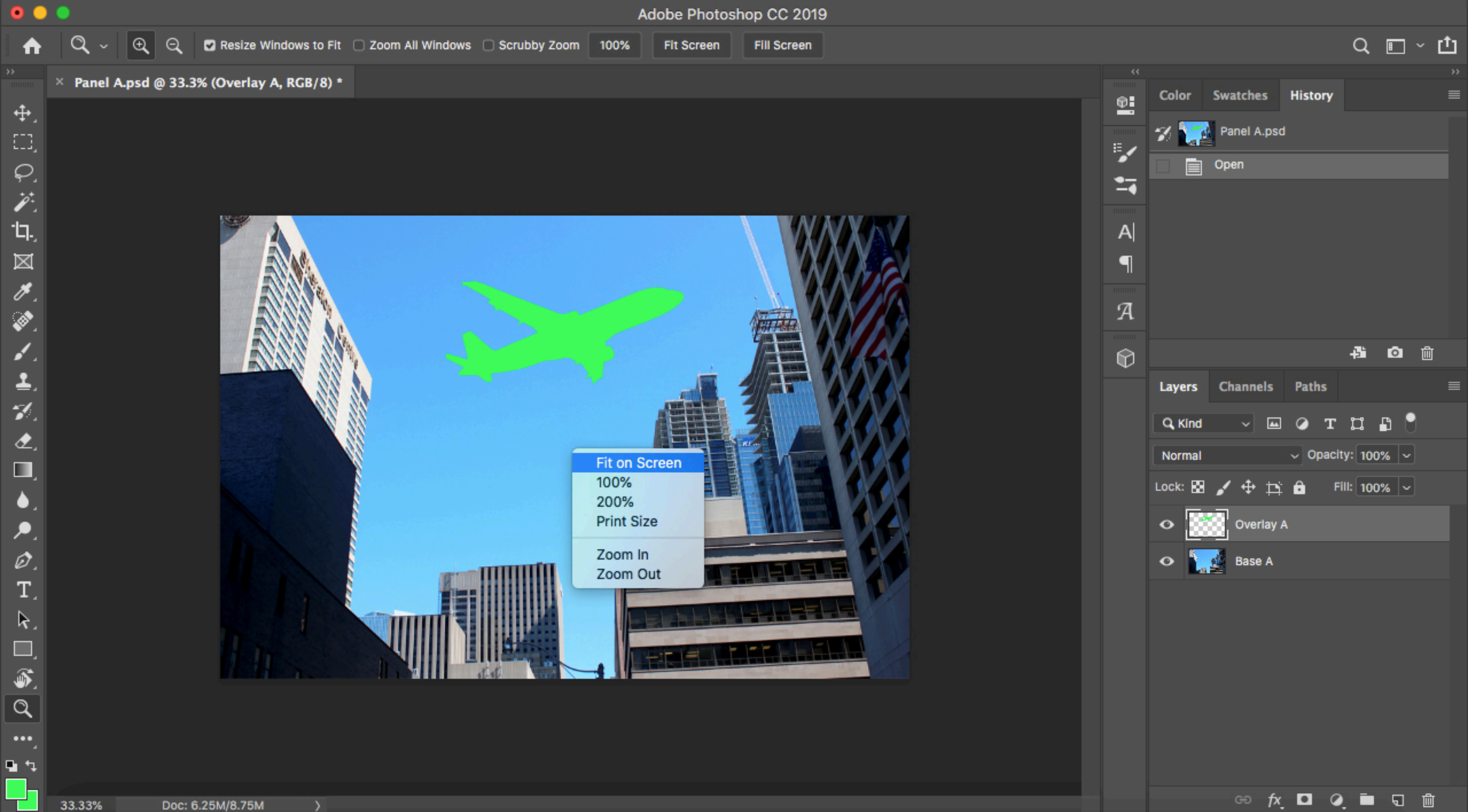
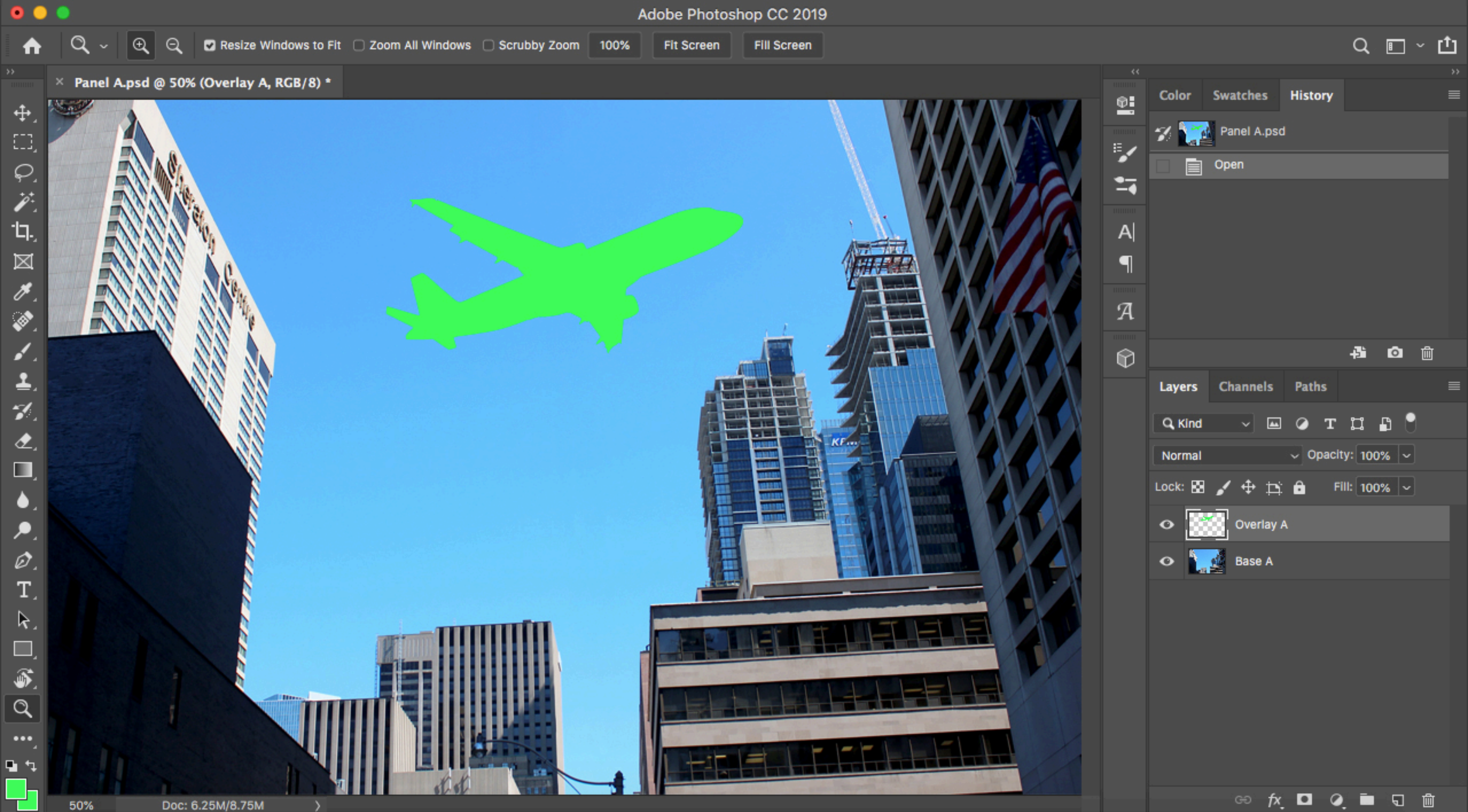


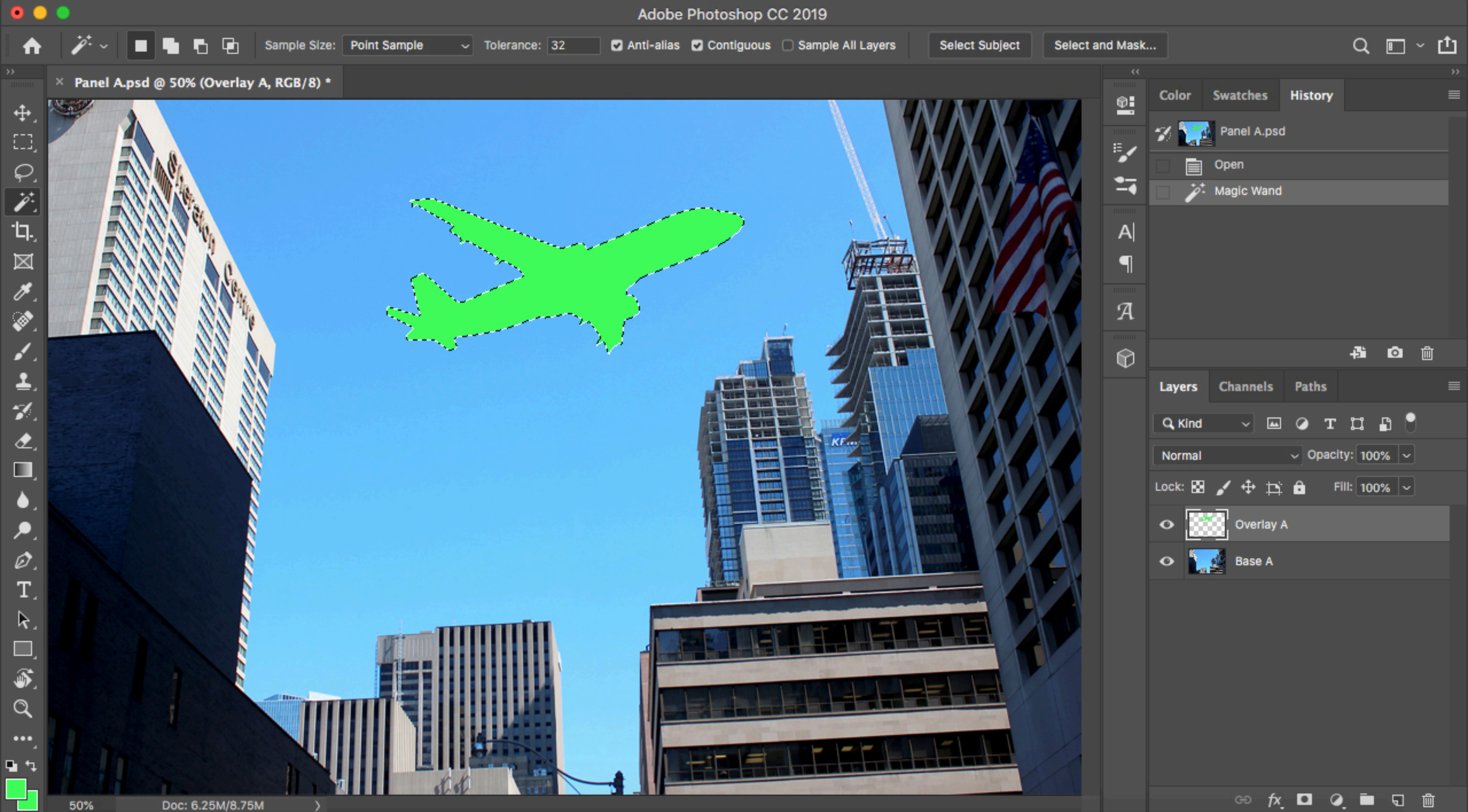
1. Open the file (labeled 'Panel' followed by a letter, and ending with the '.psd' extension) in Adobe Photoshop. The example images use Photoshop CC, but any version will work.



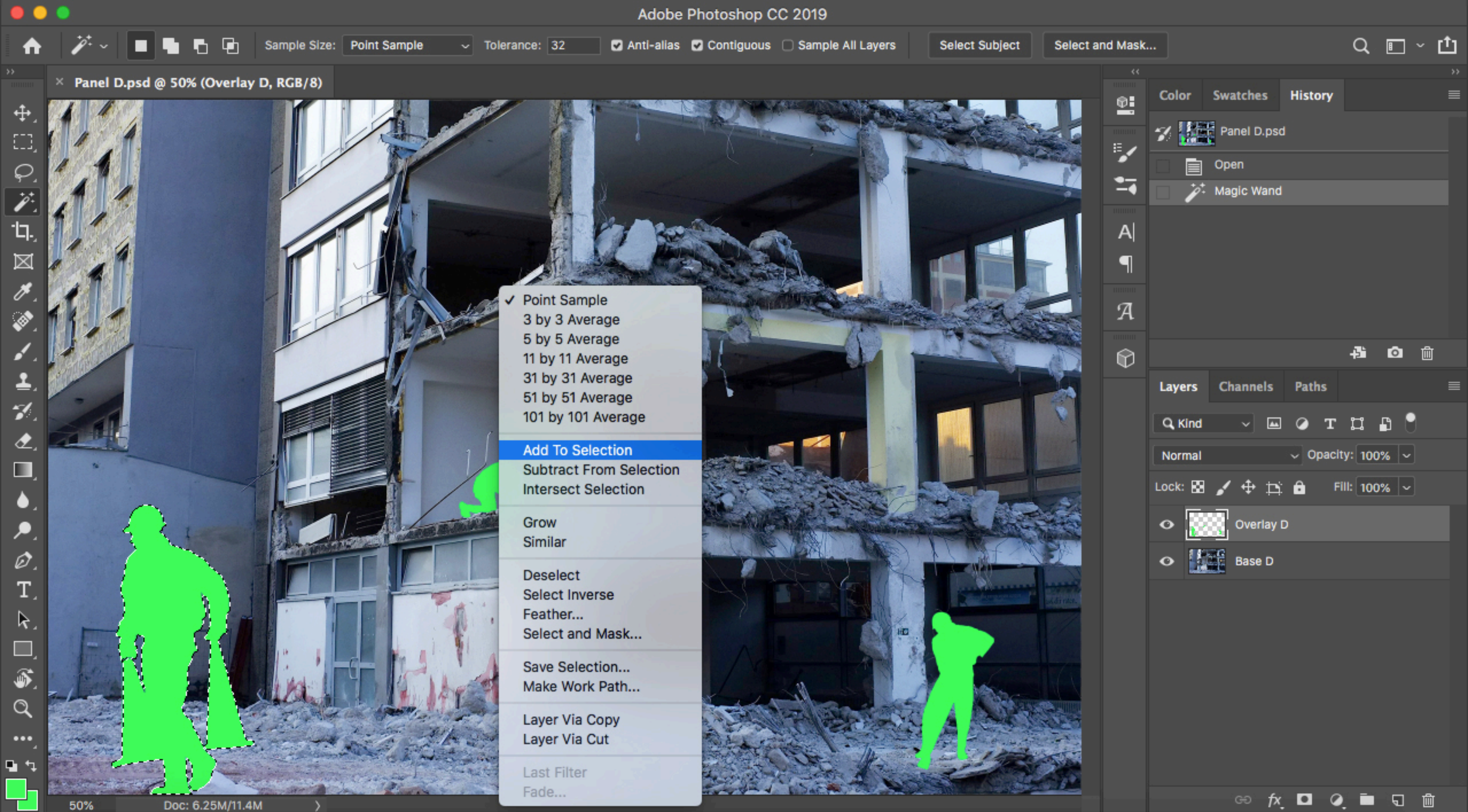
2. Select the magnification tool, then right-click on the image and select 'Fit on Screen.'



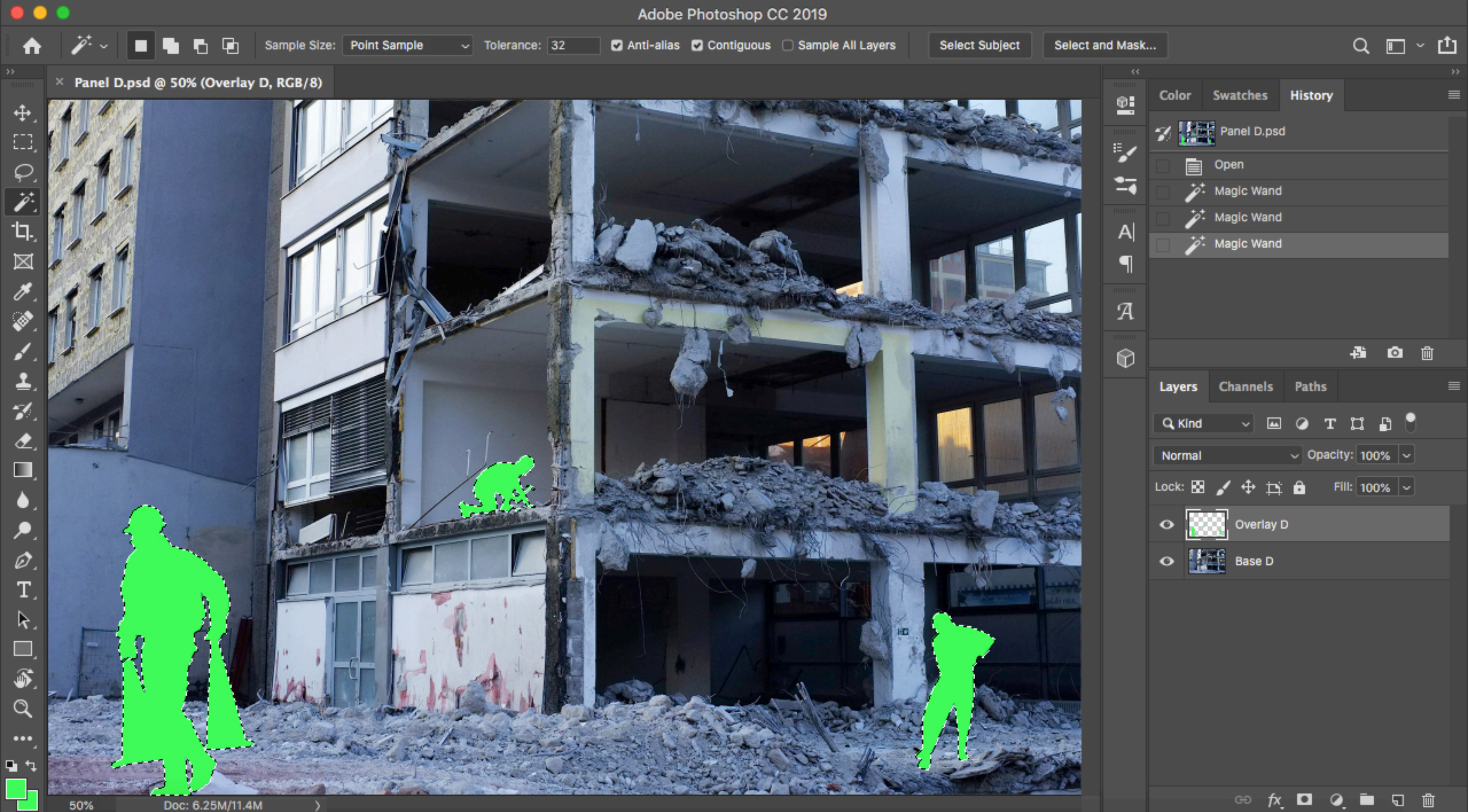
3. If the image appears blurry, slightly increase the magnification until it appears crisp and in focus. It's ok if a few pixels around the border are out of frame.



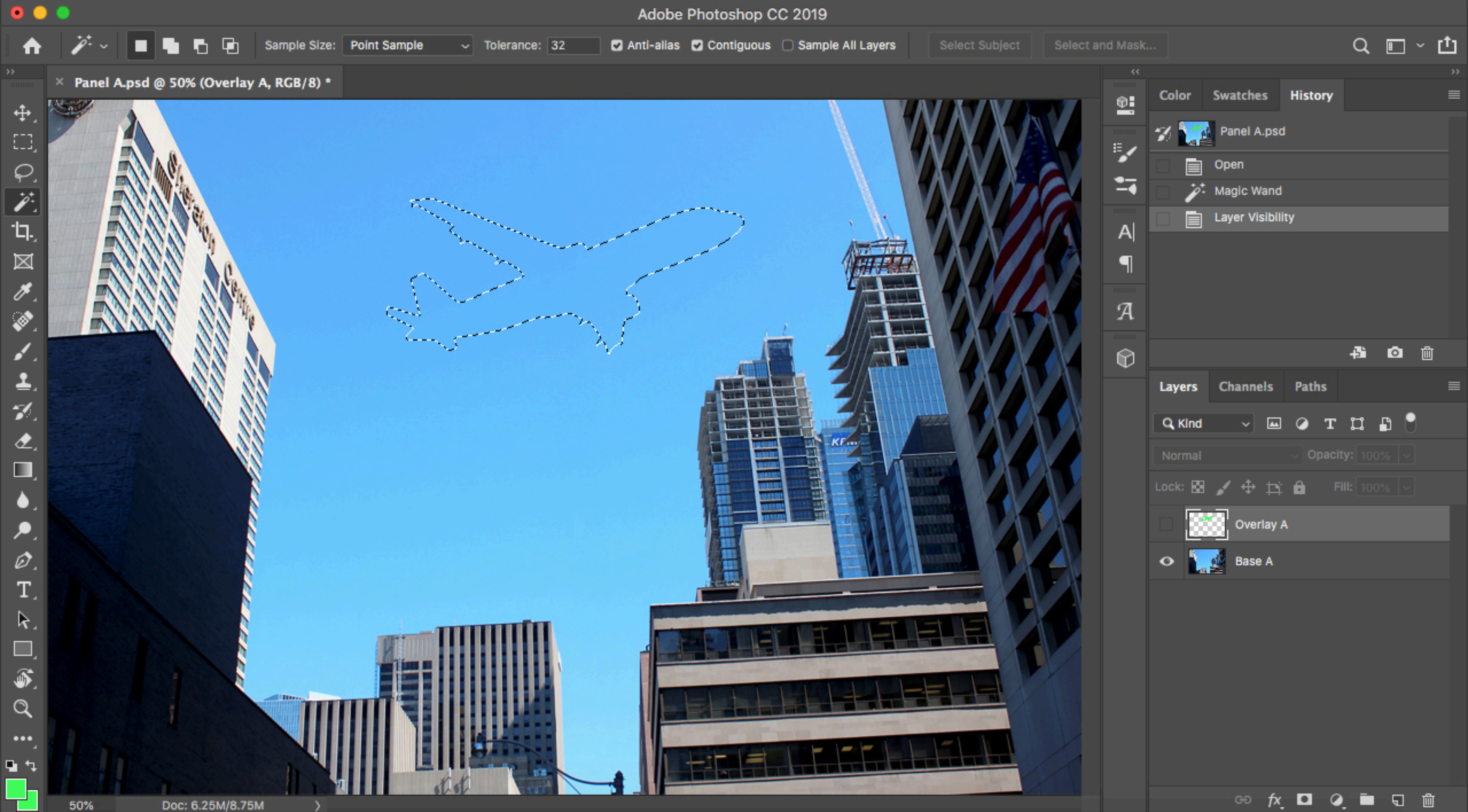
4. Making sure that the 'Overlay' layer is selected, select the magic wand tool and click on the green overlay image.



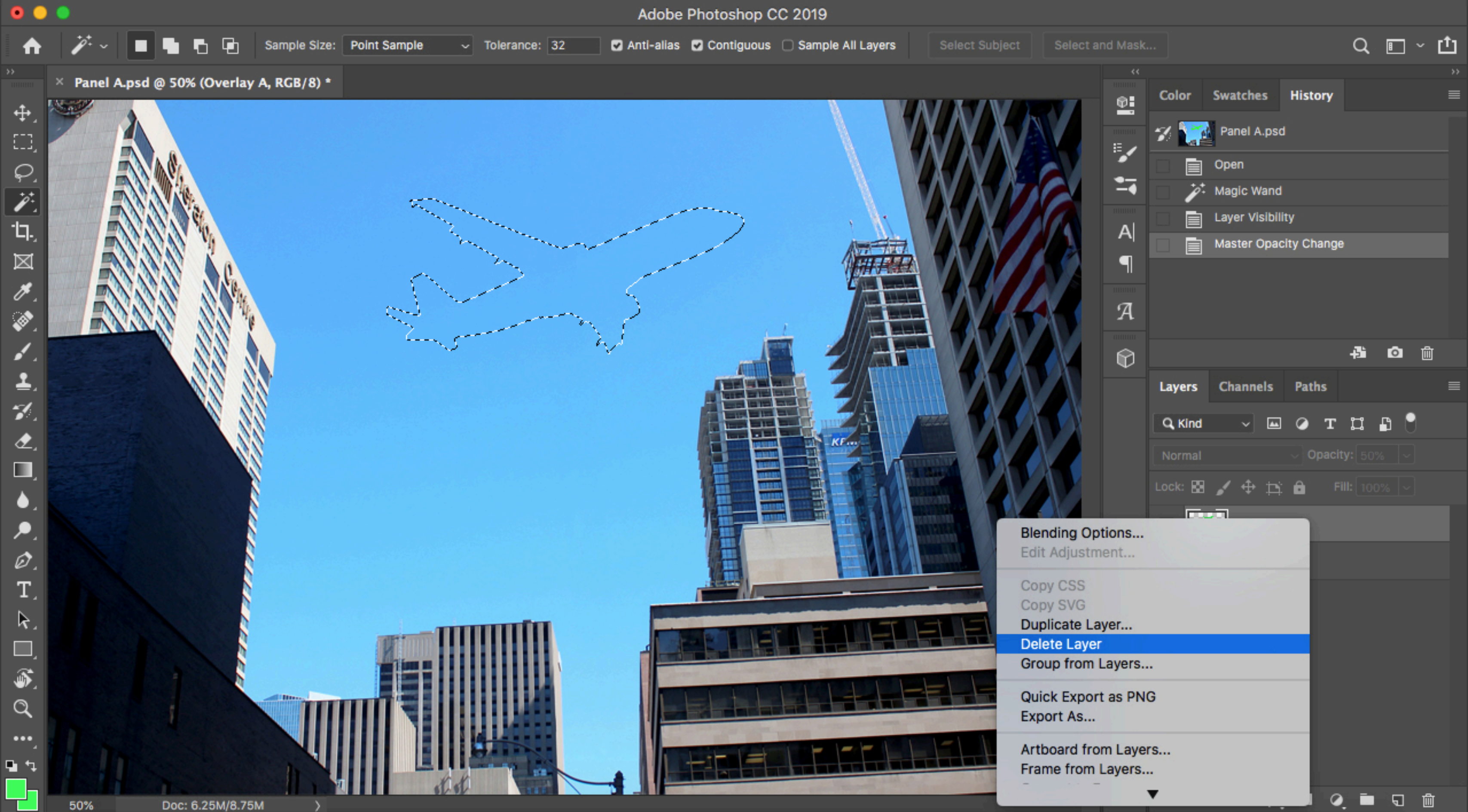
5. If there are multiple images in the 'Overlay' layer, select one, then right-click on the next and select 'Add to Selection.'



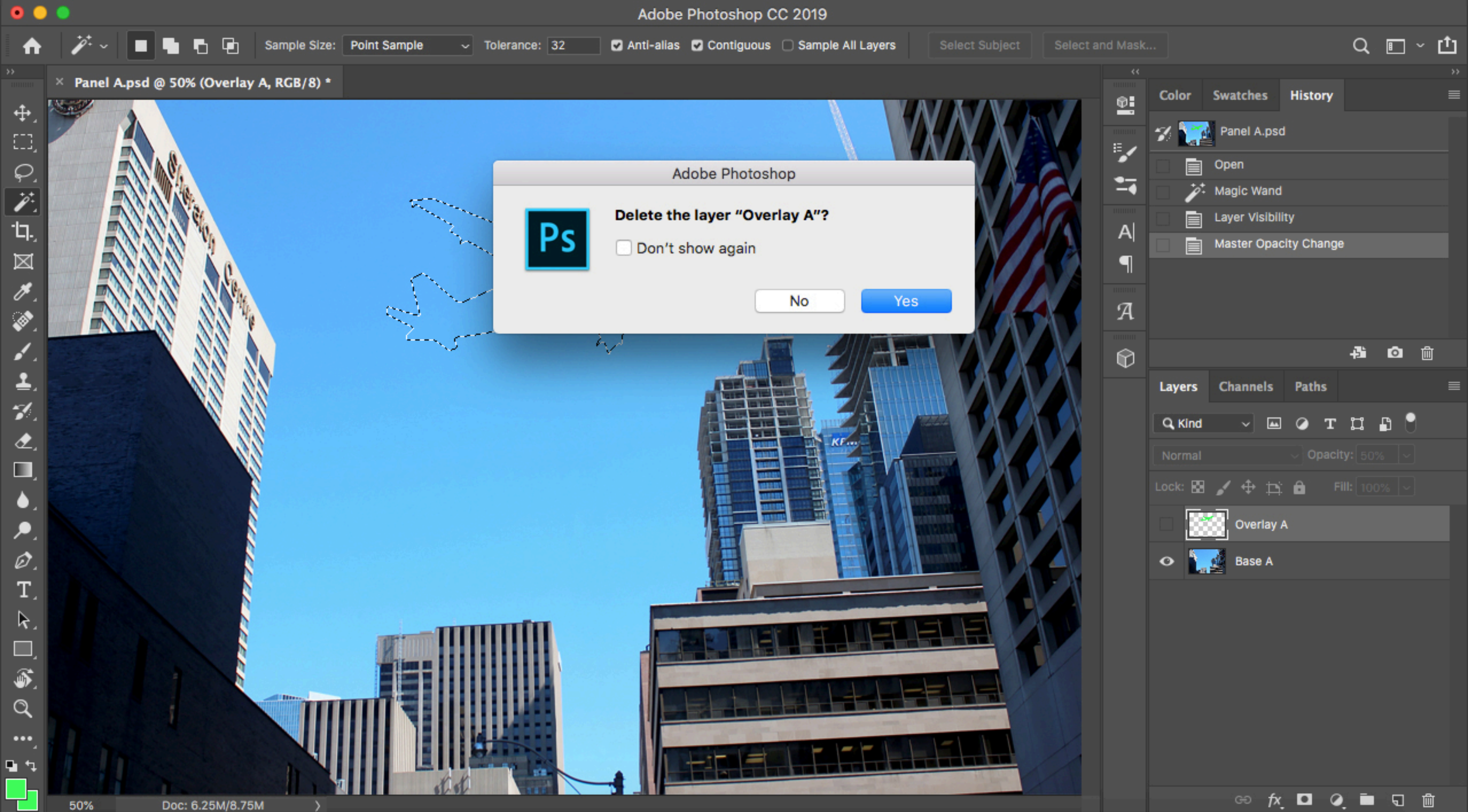
5(cont). Repeat this until all images in the 'Overlay' layer have been added.



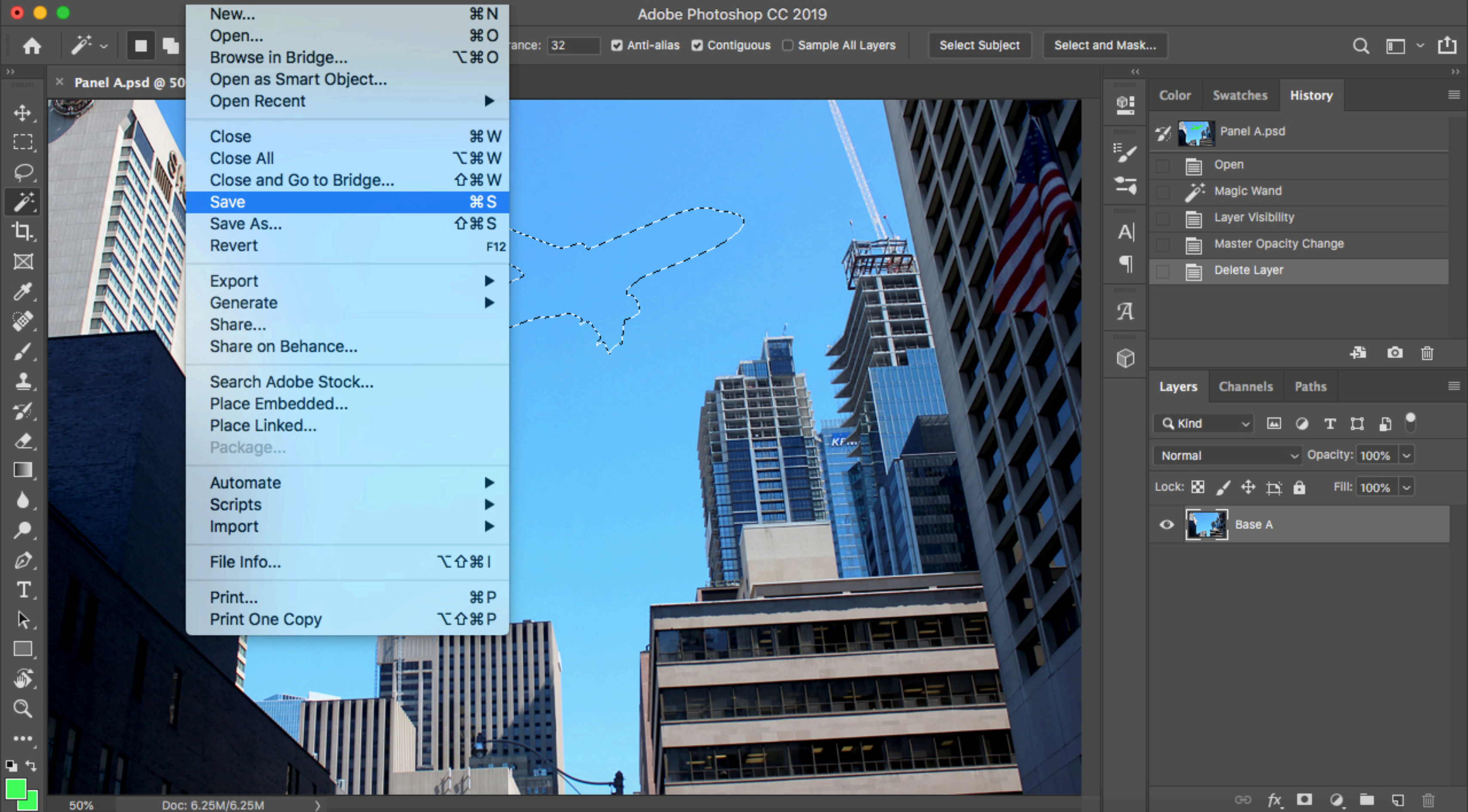
6. Turn off visibility for the 'Overlay' layer.



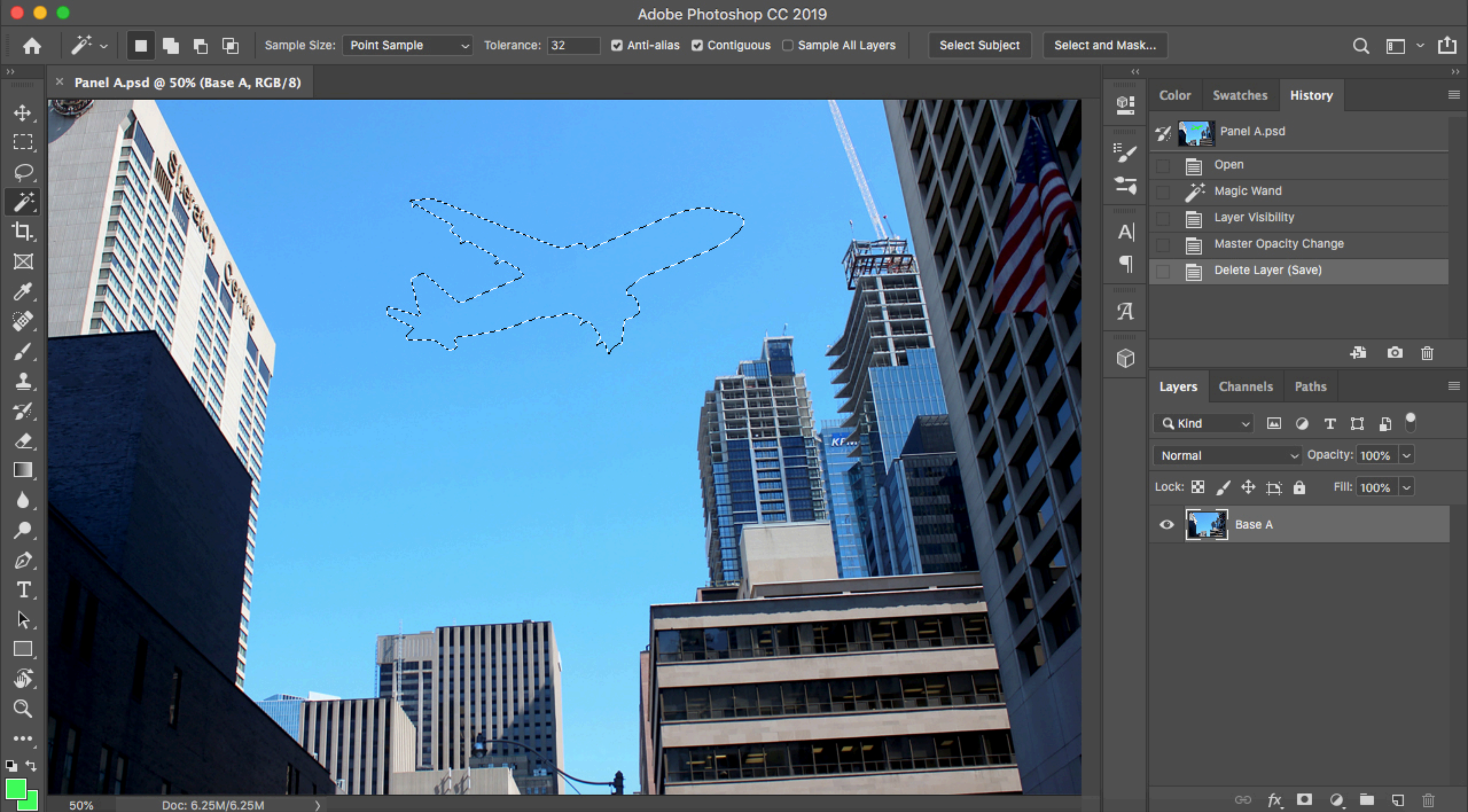
7. Delete the 'Overlay' layer.



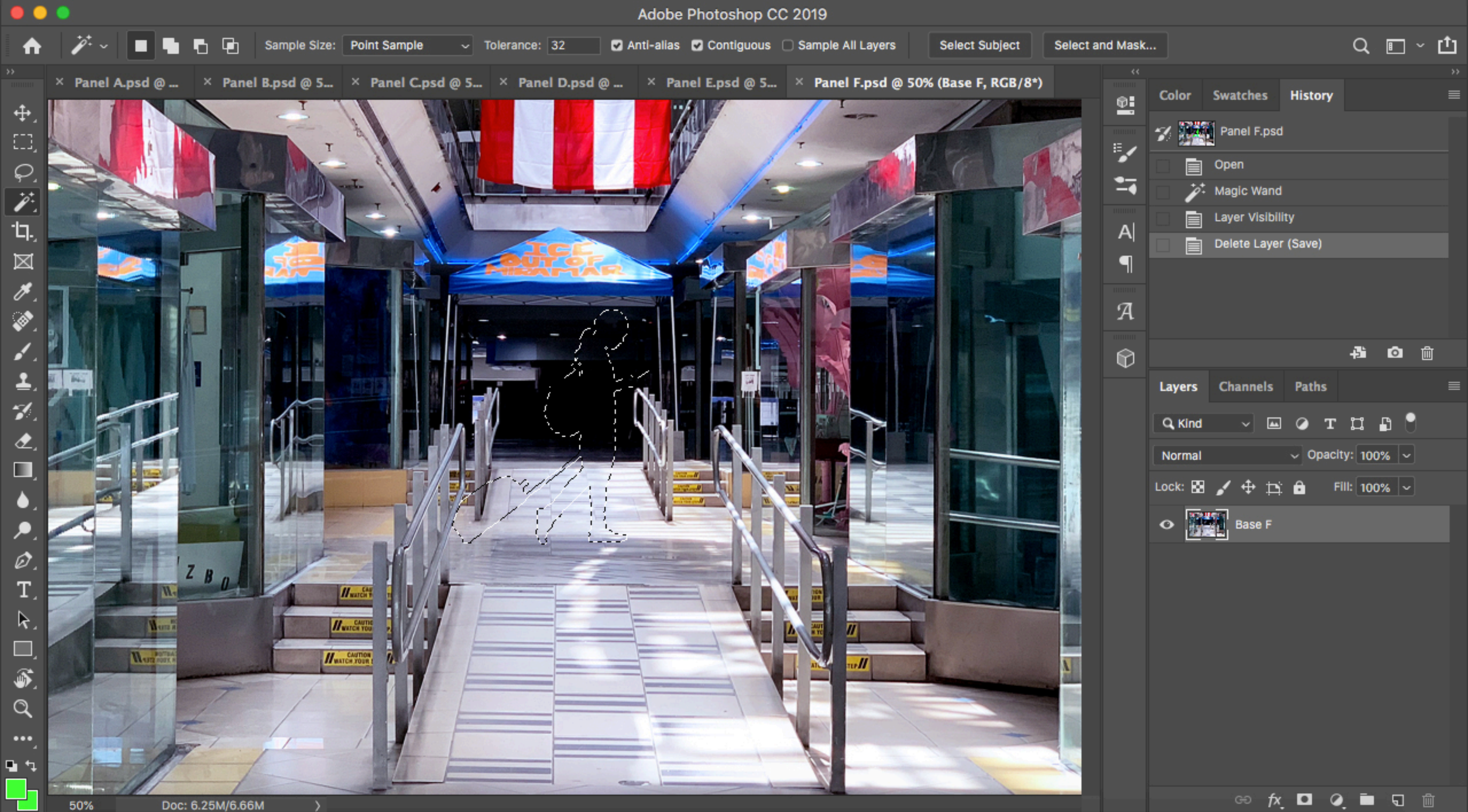
7(cont). You may be asked to confirm.



8. Save the file. The animated selection outline should still be present within the frame. Make sure not to deselect it, as the referent image is now gone.



9. The Panel is now fully installed.



10. Repeat this process until all six Panels have been installed. Keep each open in a separate tab in order to view the work in its ideal configuration.
